Assessing Bird Use of Rhode Island's Offshore Waters

How will the proposed offshore wind farm affect bird species in Rhode Island? The Rhode Island Ocean SAMP is undertaking marine spatial planning for R.I. offshore waters through a process that integrates the best available science with open public input and involvement. This lecture will investigate avian use of the study area by determining the distribution and abundance of birds, their movement ecology, and their temporal variation in offshore waters. There is no fee for this lecture, but registration by March 2, 2010, is required.



Underwater Archaeology Uncovers Block Island's Sunken History

Rod Mather, URI History Professor

Marine archaeologist Rod Mather will describe underwater archaeological sites close to Block Island and the work that his team has been doing as part of the R.I. Ocean SAMP. That work includes historic research, ocean survey, archaeological site assessment using SCUBA, and the development of GIS databases.

The potential archaeological sites in the waters off Block Island are quite extensive and include shipwrecks from the last century.
